#### HEAD START Pam Sangs

The following was from an article that I just read and would like to share with my West Austin families in honor of Black History Month:

The Child Development Group of Mississippi (CDGM) Head Start program was Black Mississippians' next battle in the long struggle to secure freedom and equality after the 1964 Civil Rights Act. The Presbyterian Church offered important support at crucial times for the effort.

Head Start, a component of President Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty, was authorized by the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and administered by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO). In an era when most states did not offer public kindergartens, the program aimed to prepare disadvantaged children for first grade. The early childhood education initiative began as an eightweek summer program in the summer of 1965 and became a year-round program that fall.
